Course Description: ECON 002-920 is the summer course in macroeconomics for LPS and undergraduate students. Macroeconomics studies the aggregate behavior of the economy. In the first part of the course, students will learn how to measure economic performance and the meaning of terms such as GDP, unemployment, and inflation. The main focus of this course will subsequently be the models that attempt to explain the determination of national output. We will examine the long-run growth of national income as well as the short-run fluctuations in national income (i.e., recessions and booms). Throughout the course we will explore how government policies can influence the performance of the economy.

Prerequisites: The official prerequisite for this course is Econ 001.
